**MINUTES OF ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
THORNTON CENTRAL SCHOOL
MARCH 12, 2015**

Moderator Robert Gannett called the meeting to order at 7:00p.m. SAU #48 Superintendent Mark Halloran and Thornton Central School Principal Jonathan Bownes were introduced. School Board members introduced were Cara Towers, Teri Gabbeitt, Barry VanDeMoere, Ashley Sanborn and Tim Tyler.

A motion was made to dispense the reading of the Warrant in its entirety, the motion was seconded. There was no discussion and the motion to dispense the reading of the Warrant in its entirety passed by voice vote.

Article 1: To see what action the School District will take relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers. **A motion was made and seconded to accept Article 1. There was no discussion and the motion to accept Article 1 passed with a voice vote.**

Article 2: To see if the School District will vote to establish a contingency fund in accordance with Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-b, such contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and, further, to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for such contingency fund. (The School Board recommends the appropriation.) (Majority vote required.) **A motion was made and seconded to accept Article 2. There was no discussion and the motion to accept Article 2 passed with a voice vote.**

Article 3: To see if the School District will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Thornton School Board and the Thornton Education Association which calls for the following increases in salary and benefits:

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-two thousand eighty-three dollars (\$52,083.00) for the 2015-2016 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. (The School Board recommends this appropriation.) (Majority vote required.)

Article 4: To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four million three hundred seventy-nine thousand thirty-three dollars (\$4,379,033) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials, employees and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, which does not include the sums found in Articles 2, 3 and includes sums previously approved for salaries. (The School Board recommends this appropriation.) (Majority vote required.)
A motion was made and seconded to accept Article 4. There was no discussion and the motion to accept Article 4 passed with a voice vote.

Article 5: To transact any further business which may legally come before this meeting. **A motion was made and seconded to accept Article 5.**

School Board Chair Teri Gabbeitt recognized Robert Gannett and presented him with a plaque for his dedication and 35 years of service for the Thornton School District as Moderator.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The motion passed by voice vote and the meeting adjourned at 7:11 p.m.

It is our pleasure to report to you on the progress our schools are making, as we strive to give every student in SAU #48 the opportunity to attain a K-12 education that puts him/her in a position to be college/career ready upon high school graduation.

School wide academic goals have been created at all of the elementary schools to measure performance locally, district and statewide. Administrators and teachers continually review instructional and assessment data to guarantee that students meet their potential. SAU #48 continues to maintain the importance of the arts, music, theatre, wellness, athletics, and extended learning opportunities as part of an integrated approach to education.

Teachers have worked collaboratively across SAU #48, creating high standards and adopting competencies in the arts, social studies, music, guidance, and technology. These educators researched best practice and created performance indicators for students to excel in those specific content areas. We will coordinate adopting competencies in math, physical education, and health for the 2016-2017 school year.

Technology enables educational innovation to prepare students for college and career success in the 21st century. Using technology to empower students to engage in learning aligns with our curriculum goals by its integration of all content areas; enriching extended learning with after-school and summer programming. We continue to upgrade our technology tools, web sites, wireless, and network infrastructure to support the interactive online resources.

Students in grades 3-8 and 11 were administered the Smarter Balanced Assessment in both Math and English/Language Arts this past spring. In grades 4 and 8, students were administered the NECAP Science Assessments. We continue to locally assess all students in the SAU with the NorthWest Evaluation Association (NWEA) to measure growth during each academic year.

All of our educators are immersed in professional development opportunities. Every year, educators attend the summer Google Summit to engage in learning about new uses of Google tools. Educators have engaged in professional development utilizing a new K-12 digital science series and proven instructional practices to enhance student learning.

Please know that your support and generosity are never taken for granted. We sincerely appreciate everything our communities do to strengthen and improve our schools.

2014-2015 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Thornton Central School continued to have another excellent school year. The students do well academically and in extra-curricular activities when compared to their peers within the State of New Hampshire and nationally.

To better serve our students, we have changed our structure in grades five through eight. We have moved the fifth grade students from a self-contained classroom to a 5-6 team with teachers instructing content areas related to their academic strengths. The previous 6-8 team now is a 7-8 team and allows both groups of students and teachers to focus a developmentally appropriate curriculum for two consecutive years.

This year, Caitlin Estee and Tanya O'Brien have been added to our professional faculty. Caitlin graduated from Keene State University and has previous experience as a reading interventionist in Hillsboro. Tanya has previously taught for many years at Wentworth Elementary School. Caitlin is teaching literacy with the 5-6 team and Tanya is teaching a self-contained fourth grade classroom.

I would like to thank Ann Knowles, Bruce Blackburn and Joanne Marcotte for their many years of service to the students and community to Thornton. Ann and Joanne will retire at the end of the 2015-2016 school year and Mr. Blackburn retired in January.

Our co-curricular activities continue to give students opportunities to grow outside the academic environment. Last year, the Destination Imagination team won the NH State competition and competed at the national level in Tennessee. The girls' field hockey, basketball, softball and boys' baseball teams were named Pemi Baker League champions. We continue to have many former Thornton students become captains of their high school athletic teams, become major characters in school performances, and move on to do well at the collegiate level.

Thornton Central School prospers because of all the hard work and effort our community puts into it. We continually have a large group of volunteers who give their time to help make our school a better place. To all those who have helped with coaching, fundraising, winter activities, classroom parties, PTO, Destination Imagination and chaperoning – Thank you!

2014-2015 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE THORNTON SCHOOL NURSE

I would like to submit this annual report for the 2015-2016 school year. Our current enrollment at Thornton Central School is 191 in grades kindergarten through eight as of December 7, 2015.

Yearly health updates from parents are being reviewed and entered into SNAP, our computerized health records for all students. The state immunization report was completed in November on-line.

Medications given on a daily basis are 5 this year. I also do other nursing jobs such as toileting for students who require this intervention.

We had a staff flu clinic at school on October 15, 2015 and 23 staff were immunized against the flu. We also had a student flu clinic at school on October 14, 2015 where 62 students were immunized against the flu.

I send a daily report to the state of New Hampshire of flu- like illness which has been low lately. I also track other outbreaks of contagious diseases such as strep throat and gastrointestinal illnesses.

I maintain a web site on the Thornton Central School web page which contains health information and have Mrs. Campbell send home health and safety information via email with the weekly announcements. This year we have been concentrating on Wellness-related information as our Wellness Committee is meeting to update our school Wellness Policy. We encourage teachers, students, and parents to participate in the 5210 Healthy NH plan to decrease childhood obesity. This plan encourages daily intake of 5 fruits and vegetables, limiting screen time on computers, and TVs to 2 hours or less a day, encourages 1 hour every day of physical activity and 0 soda or sugary sports or fruit drinks. We have sent home info to parents on healthy snacks and healthy celebrations.

I review emergency plans for children who have medical concerns which might require emergency intervention on a monthly basis via email with staff who are directly involved with these students.

Dr. Alan Rosen, of Midstate Health Center, our school physician, provided free sports physicals for 14 students in grades 5-8 on September 23, 2015. He will be returning on May 11, 2016 to do sports physicals for eighth graders who plan to participate in the Plymouth Regional High School next fall.

I participated in the new Campton-Thornton Got Lunch Program which provides free healthy lunches to children in Campton and Thornton on a weekly basis throughout the summer. We deliver these food packages to homes of anyone who applies for this program.

I am a member of our school safety committee. We try to prevent any safety issues. I have prepared a budget for the 2016-2017 school year and order supplies as needed throughout the school year.

We provide the Speare Memorial Hospital Dental Program twice a year. Ruth Doane, our dental hygienist, provides screenings, cleanings and topical fluoride applications as well as sealants right here at school with parental permission.

I am a member of the New Hampshire School Nurses' Association and also organize monthly SAU 48 school nurse meetings where we review policies and health problems in our SAU.
